



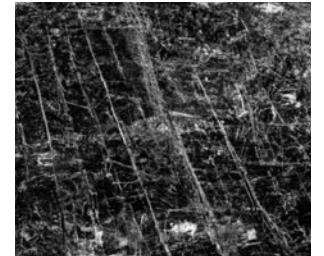
Every where
